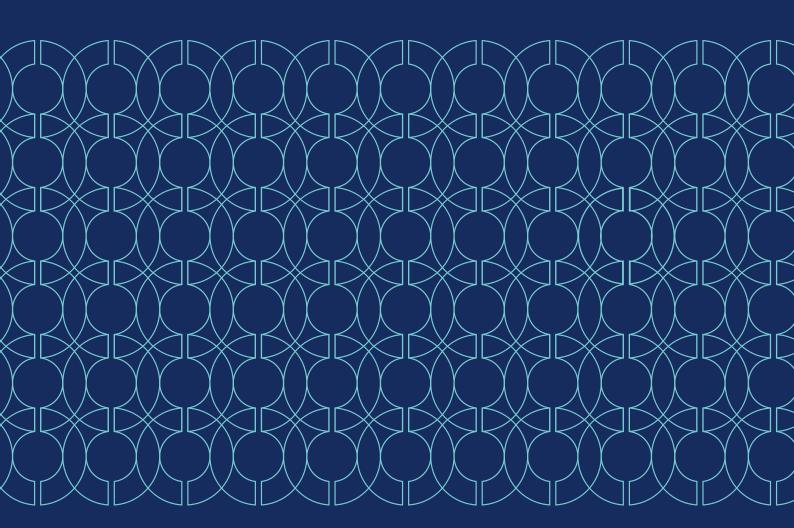

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Fund Information

Investment objective and policy

Schroder Institutional Developing Markets Fund (the "Fund") aims to achieve long-term capital appreciation through investment in equity, equity-related and debt securities benefiting from the economic growth of emerging markets. For the purposes of the Fund, "emerging markets" are defined as those countries not in the Morgan Stanley Capital International ("MSCI") World Index.

Manager's Report

Fund performance

In the six months to 31 March 2024 the Fund's net asset value per unit (based on bid prices) increased from US \$34.16 to US \$37.53 (A share class) and increased from US \$33.88 to US \$38.12 (B share class). The Fund returned 12.2% (based on A Shares) after adjusting for distributions, compared to a return of 10.4% for the Morgan Stanley Capital International (MSCI) Emerging Markets ('EM') Index.

The fund posted a strong performance over the 6-months ending March 2024 and outperformed its benchmark, the MSCI Emerging Markets (EM) Index with both country allocation and stock selection driving returns.

In terms of country allocation, the overweights to Taiwan, Peru and Poland proved beneficial, as did the zero-weight to Thailand. The underweight to India and cash held in a rising market detracted.

Stock selection was particularly strong in Taiwan (overweight Taiwan Semiconductor Manufacturing Company and MediaTek) and Korea (overweight SK hynix Incorporated, zero-weight POSCO). It was also positive in South Africa (overweight Gold Fields Limited, zero-weight Sasol), Poland (overweight Bank Pekao S.A. and PKO), Chile (off-benchmark Antofagasta, underweight SQM) and Indonesia (overweight Bank Rakyat and Bank Central Asia, zero-weight Astra International). In contrast, stock selection weighed on returns in India (overweight HDFC Bank and Axis Bank) and China (overweight WuXi Biologics).

During the period we were able to exit some Russian holdings. As we had valued all remaining Russian positions at zero there was a positive impact.

The global growth outlook continues to be underpinned by resilience in the US economy. Strong final demand should spill over to the rest of the world, including EM. Indeed, there is ongoing evidence of a pickup in the global goods cycle.

Given robust US economic activity, stronger-than-expected inflation data, and that the US Federal Reserve ("Fed") has emphasised policy will be data-dependent, the risks are now skewed towards later and fewer rate cuts this year. This outcome could provide further support to the US dollar and have implications for the most US rate-sensitive EM markets.

EM inflation ex Turkey continues to fall, and EM monetary policy easing has continued. This is led by Latin America and EM Europe where real rates remain markedly higher than in many Asian economies. The past month has seen further easing from central banks in Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Czech Republic, and Hungary, while Mexico also began an easing cycle. Initiation of an easing cycle from the Fed would be supportive of further easing in EM, though the timing of the first cut may now be delayed, and the degree of easing this year could be more limited. Fewer or no cuts this year would constrain EM easing cycles.

The global trade cycle should continue to act as a tailwind for EM this year. In addition to the global goods upcycle, which is driven by inventory restocking, the technology cycle is positive and is also projected to extend into 2025. Amid the current upswing in manufactured exports, we are monitoring the extent to which excess Chinese capacity and competition mute this impact, and the potential implications for trade tensions.

In China, the structural challenges persist, as the economy transitions away from an infrastructure and real estate investment-led model. We continue to expect policy stimulus to remain incremental and targeted in response to weak growth. In the nearterm there is some positive impetus from a recovery in exports and fiscal impulse. High frequency data for Jan/Feb was somewhat mixed. There may be some distortion from the timing of the Lunar New Year, but industrial production and exports were stronger than expected, while both services and manufacturing PMI picked up. On the other hand, retail sales growth continued to slow. Stress in the housing sector also continues, with both real estate sales and starts seeing renewed deceleration. At the market level, aggregate valuations remain cheap, solid double-digit earnings growth is projected for this year and 2025, and international investor sentiment remains depressed. However, geopolitics continues to overshadow the outlook. Trade tensions appear to be widening beyond the US and EU, with Brazil launching investigations into alleged dumping of industrial products. Although US-China communications have seen tentative improvement recently, the longer-term trajectory remains negative, and there is a risk that tensions with the US see renewed escalation in the run-up to the US Presidential election. US-China geopolitical tensions are a bipartisan issue in Washington.

Outlook

Manager's Report (continued)

Aggregate EM valuations are slightly above the historical median on a 12-month forward price-earnings and price book measure, but cheap on dividend yield. Consensus EM earnings expectations for 2024 and 2025 have increased to 20% and 16% respectively; these are ahead of other major markets. The EM discount to DM on a 12-month forward price-earnings basis is close to the largest for 20 years. At the individual market level, EM valuations are broadly cheap ex India, and on some measures South Korea, versus history.

The key risks to monitor are as follows. The path of US growth, inflation, the delivery and timing of Fed rate cuts and the US dollar remain crucial. The economic policy outlook in China will also be important; we do not currently anticipate a significant ramp-up in stimulus, but should this materialise, it would present upside risk. Geopolitics is a further area to consider, including developments in the conflicts in Ukraine and the Middle East, in particular the potential impact on energy prices from further escalation. Higher crude oil prices pose upside risk to inflation. There are also a series of EM elections remaining this year, including in India, Mexico, and South Africa as well as US elections in November.

Investment Adviser's Review (continued)

Current strategy

In Asia, we are overweight Taiwan (positive structural and cyclical outlook for tech) and Indonesia (reform progress, good structural story priced in for now). We are neutral China (macro headwinds, fragile confidence and incremental policy support, sentiment negative, geopolitical risk) and Korea (trade cycle recovering, valuations attractive, potential governance reform). We are underweight Philippines (twin deficits remain but macro positive and monetary policy inflecting, illiquid market), Malaysia (undervalued currency, reasonable valuations, weak returns), Thailand (slow growth, unattractive valuations) and India (structural growth opportunity, expensive valuations, slowing earnings growth).

In Latin America we are overweight Brazil (monetary easing, attractive valuations, concerns re fiscal sustainability), Chile (monetary easing, attractive valuations, regulatory risk lower), Peru (low growth, strong stock opportunity) and Argentina (bottom-up stock opportunity). We are neutral Mexico (policy concerns, near-shoring beneficiary, defensive market). We are underweight Colombia (lack of bottom-up opportunities).

In EMEA, we are overweight Greece (strong long term growth outlook, EU recovery fund supportive, ongoing reform momentum, attractive valuations). Poland (good medium term growth outlook, attractive valuations, positive political change). We are neutral Russia (due to being removed from benchmark) and South Africa (structural challenges, reform slow, attractive valuations, load shedding improving, electoral cycle poses risk). We are underweight Egypt (GCC support and IMF programme, lack of bottom-up opportunities), Czech Republic (reasonable valuations, EU recovery fund supportive, macro improving, limited stock opportunities), United Arab Emirates (positive reforms, strong tourism, strong demand for real estate, limited opportunities), Turkey (ongoing doubts regarding commitment to more orthodox policy, market valuation misleading, currency risk), Kuwait (political paralysis prevents structural reforms, unattractive valuations), Qatar (slower growth, valuations reasonable but limited stock opportunities) and Saudi Arabia (societal change, economic transformation programme, unattractive valuations).

Emerging markets (EM) posted strong returns over the 6-month period ending March 2024 although they were some way behind those delivered by developed markets. Signs of a "soft landing" for the US economy and increased expectations for interest rate cuts in 2024 were supportive at the start of the period, although recent robust US economic data has rekindled the prospect of "higher for longer" US rates. Continued weakness in China was a drag on broad EM performance.

Peru, Poland and Colombia were the top three performers with all markets benefiting from some degree of monetary policy easing. Adding to Poland's performance was the 2023 re-election of Donald Tusk to prime minister at the head of a pro-EU liberal coalition government, which ended the 8-year rule of the populist Law & Justice (PiS) party. Taiwan and Korea also gained strongly on the back of continued investor enthusiasm about artificial intelligence (AI) and the tech sector. Investors also welcomed political developments in Taiwan as January 2024 saw the ruling Democratic Progressive Party (DPP) remain in power but lose its majority in parliament during the country's presential elections. India outperformed against a backdrop of moderating inflation and widespread support of the ruling Bharatiya Janata Party ahead of April's general election, in which incumbent Prime Minister Modi seeks a third term.

Brazil underperformed given its sensitivity to US monetary policy. Profit-taking at the start of 2024, following a strong 2023 had a further negative impact over the period. China delivered negative returns as economic data was mixed, stimulus measures remained limited, and the real estate crisis continued to worry investors. A re-surfacing of US-China tension, in the form of potential gaming regulation and attempts by US lawmakers to discourage US investments into China, also weighed on sentiment over the period. Egypt generated the worst returns over the period as the central bank finally allowed a significant currency devaluation in 2024.

Basis of preparation

Schroder Institutional Developing Markets Fund is an open-ended Unit Trust constituted under the laws of Guernsey by deed on 17 January 2001.

The Fund has been authorised by the Guernsey Financial Services Commission under the Protection of Investors (Bailiwick of Guernsey) Law 2020 as a Class B Scheme as defined in the Authorised Collective Investment Schemes (Class B) Rules and Guidance, 2021.

The accounting date of the Fund is 30 September in each year. The units of the Fund are listed on The International Stock Exchange ('TISE') and were delisted from the Irish Stock exchange on 15 July 2016. Effective from 15 July 2016, the Fund changed from Secondary listing to Primary listing on the TISE. Prices of the units in the Fund are published in the Financial Times in the "FT Managed Funds Service" section under the heading, "Schroder Inv Mgmt (Guernsey) Ltd (Regulated)".

It is the intention of the Manager to conduct the affairs of the Fund so as to ensure that it will not become resident in the United Kingdom. Accordingly, and provided that the Fund does not carry on a trade in the United Kingdom through a branch or agency situated therein, the Fund will not be subject to United Kingdom Corporation Tax or Income Tax.

Under The Offshore Funds (Tax) Regulations, the Fund has received approval from the HMRC as a reporting fund with effect from 01 October 2010. For the accounting year ended 30 September 2011 and future years, details of the reportable income that a UK investor should declare as taxable income have been published in the Schroders website (https://www.schroders.com/en-gb/uk/institutional/funds-and-strategies/guernsey-fund-income-tables/) within six months of the end of each accounting year.

Alternative Investment Fund Managers Directive (AIFMD)

The AIFMD, as implemented in the UK by the Alternative Investment Fund Managers (AIFMs) Regulations 2013, establishes an EU wide harmonised framework for monitoring and supervising risks posed by AIFMs and the alternative investment funds (AIFs) they manage.

The Fund is an AIF and Schroder Unit Trusts Limited ("SUTL") was authorised by the Financial Conduct Authority to act as an AIFM on 2 July 2014.

The AIFMD requires certain information to be disclosed to unitholders. It is intended that any such information will in future be provided in the report and accounts, unless such information is required to be disclosed without delay, in which case it will be made via the Schroders website at:

AIFMD remuneration disclosures for Schroder Unit Trusts Limited ('SUTL') for the year to 31 December 2023

These disclosures form part of the non-audited section of this annual report and accounts and should be read in conjunction with the Schroders plc Remuneration Report on pages 74 to 93 of the 2023 Annual Report & Accounts (available on the Group's website – www.schroders.com/ir) which provides more information on the activities of our Remuneration Committee and our remuneration principles and policies.

The AIF Material Risk Takers ('AIF MRTs') of SUTL are individuals whose roles within the Schroders Group can materially affect the risk of SUTL or any AIF fund that it manages. These roles are identified in line with the requirements of the AIFM Directive and guidance issued by the European Securities and Markets Authority.

The Remuneration Committee of Schroders plc has established a remuneration policy to ensure the requirements of the AIFM Directive are met for all AIF MRTs. The Remuneration Committee and the Board of Schroders plc review remuneration strategy at least annually. The directors of SUTL are responsible for the adoption of the remuneration policy and periodically reviewing its implementation in relation to SUTL. During 2023 the Remuneration Policy was reviewed to ensure compliance with the UCITS/AIFMD remuneration requirements and no significant changes were made.

The implementation of the remuneration policy is, at least annually, subject to independent internal review for compliance with the policies and procedures for remuneration adopted by the Board of SUTL and the Remuneration Committee. The most recent review found no fundamental issues but resulted in minor recommendations relating to policy documentation.

General Information (continued)

Our ratio of operating compensation costs to net operating income guides the total spend on remuneration each year. This is recommended by the Remuneration Committee to the Board of Schroders plc. This approach aligns remuneration with Schroders financial performance. In determining the remuneration spend each year, the underlying strength and sustainability of the business is taken into account, along with reports on risk & compliance, legal and internal audit matters from the heads of those areas.

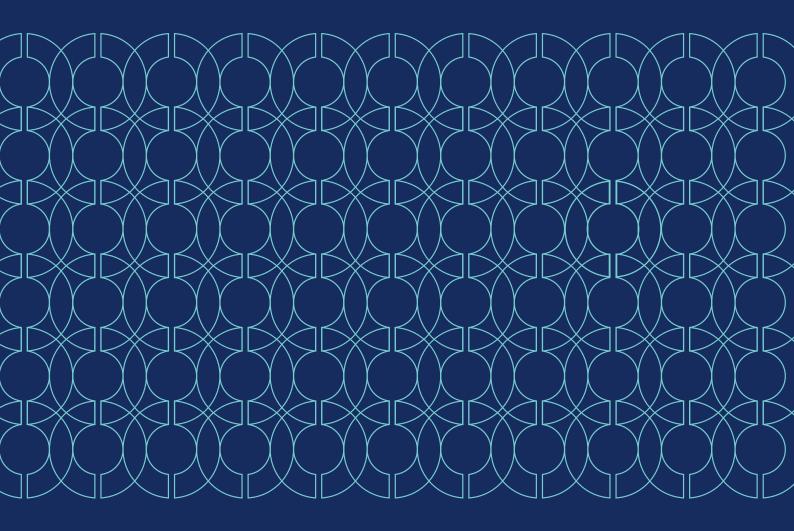
The remuneration data that follows reflects amounts paid in respect of performance during 2023.

- The total amount of remuneration paid by SUTL to its staff was nil as SUTL has no employees. SUTL has two independent Non Executive Directors who receive fees in respect of their role on the Board of SUTL¹. Employees of other Schroders Group entities who serve as Directors of SUTL receive no additional fee in respect of their role on the Board of SUTL.
- The following disclosures relate to AIF MRTs of SUTL. Most of those AIF MRTs were employed by and provided services to other Schroders group companies and clients. In the interests of transparency, the aggregate remuneration figures that follow reflect the full remuneration for each SUTL AIF MRT. The aggregate total remuneration paid to the 157 AIF MRTs of SUTL in respect of the financial year ended 31 December 2023 is £80.53 million, of which £43.98 million was paid to senior management, £34.12 million was paid to MRTs deemed to be taking risk on behalf of SUTL or the AIF funds that it manages and £2.43 million was paid to Control Function MRTs.
